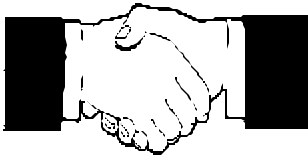

## CITY OF AKRON ACCIDENT REPORTING PROCESS

- **All Incident Reports, Supervisor's Reports and Witness Statements should be printed on light green paper.**
- **INCIDENT REPORT- The injured employee completes the Incident Report form. The information must be complete and legible. The supervisor can assist the employee in completing the report if needed. Ensure that the information is in the employee's own words.**
- **Notify Employee Benefits within 24 hours. Fax the Incident Report to Employee Benefits at (330) 375-2239. Do not wait until the investigation has been completed.**
- **SUPERVISOR'S INVESTIGATION REPORT-**

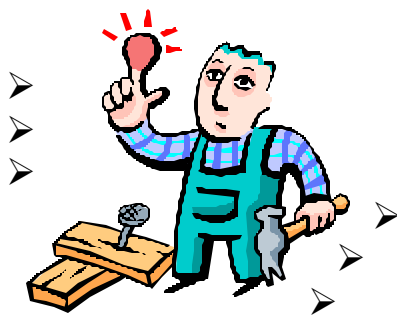


The supervisor will complete the Supervisor's Report following his investigation within 48 hours of the accident. This form may be typed or handwritten.

- **WITNESS STATEMENT- Witnesses who are either directly involved or viewed the accident should complete the Witness Statement form. The supervisor can assist the employee in completing the form if**

needed. Ensure that the information is in the witness's own words.

- **MEDICAL SLIPS-** Medical slips are required for all absences due to work-related injury.
- **Forward all original documents (Incident Report, Supervisor's Investigation Report, Witness Statements, and medical slips) to Employee Benefits.**

## **FIRE REPORTING UPDATE**

There still seems to be problems with properly filling out line #35 – Equipment Involved in Ignition, there must be entries on lines 56, 57, 58, and 59. If you are not sure, the word unknown must be entered on those lines. There must be at least a basic description of the model on line 58 though.

Follow the guidelines below:

### **From NFIRS Instructions:**

**If Equipment Involved in Ignition:  
Year, Make, Model, Serial No.**

**(Line "T" of paper NFIRS report,  
Line 35 of our CAD report)**

### **Definition**

- a. These entries refer to any item of equipment involved in the ignition of a fire. The entries do not include ignitions caused by other objects of exposures.
- b. "Year" refers to the year the item of equipment was manufactured.
- c. "Make" refers to the name of the manufacturer.
- d. "Model" refers to the manufacturer's name for the model. If no such name exists, use the common physical description of the item of equipment such as, "four burner stove" or "chest-type freezer."
- e. "Serial Number" refers to the manufacturer's serial number stamped on an identification plate affixed to the item.

### **Purpose**

These entries identify specific manufactured equipment involved in ignitions. Knowing the frequency and severity of fires associated with various products makes it possible to focus public fire education on the most dangerous products and provides feedback to manufacturers and regulatory authorities.

### **Entry**

Be as specific as possible in making these entries. If necessary, place additional information in the Narrative section.

### **Example**

You have a fire in a structure that was determined to be started by a spark or arc from a defective wall outlet. This *is* equipment involved in ignition. You will list this on line 35 of our CAD fire report as "45 – switch, receptacle, outlet". On the outlet in question, you are unable to read a manufacturer's name, there is no model number on the unit, and it probably does not have a serial number. You *must* however still complete the equipment information section, lines 56-59. Since you do

not know the year, make, model, or serial number, you shall complete the section as follows for this situation:

Line 35 Equipment Involved in Ignition .....:  
45 SWITCH, RECEPTACLE, OUTLET

Line 36 Form of Heat Ignition ..... :  
HEAT ELECT EQUIP; INSUFF INFO

**(Many codes entered here indicate equipment was involved, even if you did enter “00 – No Equipment Involved, and so you must enter equipment information!!)**

Line 56 Year of Equipment Involved in Ignition.... :  
**Leave Blank if you do not know year**

Line 57 Make.....: **UNKNOWN**

Line 58 Model..... : **110 VOLT OUTLET**  
**(Line 58 - This is where you put a “general physical description” if you do not have exact make and model information. See “d” above)**

Line 59 Serial Number.....: **UNKNOWN**

There have been several reports that have not been completed in reference to Med-Assist Calls.  
**If in doubt, fill one out!**

On Line #14 – Occupant’s Name type: ex: if you were on Med 2, you would type “MED 2 HAS REPORT” on line #14. If you have any questions regarding this, feel free to contact me.

**REMINDER:** If you are ever in doubt, contact me at #2215 or Chief Ross at #2411, and we will be glad to assist you in completing the report. The State Fire Marshal will only send them back if they are not completed correctly.

### Relay For Life – 2001 Millennium Heroes

This is the 4<sup>th</sup> year that the Akron Fire Department has participated with the Relay For Life fund-raiser for the American Cancer Society. This is also the hardest letter that I have ever written. This year we dedicated our walk to Clayton Johnston, 4-year old son of firefighter B.B. Johnston. Clayton was recently diagnosed with bone cancer in his leg. He has begun a 48-week round of chemo treatments at Children's Hospital. He undergoes treatments every 3-4 weeks, depending on his white blood cell count. He will go through 13-16 chemo treatments in all. By the time this newsletter is out, Clayton will have completed his 4<sup>th</sup> round. He will be given a series of MRI's and CAT scans to see how things are going and if surgery might be beneficial. If so, July 5<sup>th</sup> has been set aside for the surgery.

Clayton is in good spirits and is a typical 4-year old but he is literally in a fight for his life. I ask that you keep him and his family in your thoughts and prayers.

Clayton was an inspiration to everyone at our relay this year. Thanks to Jim Diestel, we had over 60 walkers with Clayton's picture on our T-shirts. During our closing ceremonies, I made Clayton an Honorary Member of the Akron Fire Department with his own T-shirt and plastic helmet.

There are a few others that were exceptionally helpful and deserve to be mentioned. First, Local 330 purchased 66 luminaries to honor our past & present members of the AFD that has had some form of cancer. A very emotional service is held where all the names are read. This is a wonderful way to remember our own members. Our Honor Guard opened the relay service and led the 1<sup>st</sup> lap around the track in which was

reserved for all of the cancer survivors. They always add a touch of class wherever they perform. Michelle Reedy, Station #2, was totally incredible. In addition to leading a new team, she raised a lot of money. She also became a 24-hour walker. She was the inspiration that kept me going. Bobbie Smyth, Dispatch, donated tons of hamburger and hot-dog buns in addition to walking. No one had a reason to be hungry! John Poulos, Fire Maintenance, was one of our largest fundraisers. He and his wife did an excellent job. "Super-Sue" Holler raised the most money and turned in just under \$1,000. She has been on my team since we started and is the greatest asset I have. Tom Morrison was also there and created a 9-ton 8' tall sandcastle. His creations are always one of the highlights of the Relay. Tom has finished his treatments and is doing well at home. He is busier now that he has retired.

Most of Station #4 showed up sometime during the Relay. They were there to show support for B.B. and his family. The team from Station #4, under the leadership of Jim Diestel and Bob Donel, ran the entire 24-hours. This is their 2<sup>nd</sup> time they have completed this tremendous feat. Guy Randall headed up a team from Station #3. He did a great job and able to recruit a lot of new faces. I apologize if I have missed anyone.

The grand total from Akron Fire was nearly \$5,000. Without a lot of work, help, and faith this could not have been possible. I am forever indebted to everyone that was involved. You all did an incredible job. Thank You!!

Please let me know if you have any 'new' ideas on making the Relay more enjoyable. I am always open to ideas. Also, please let me know if you become aware of any Akron firefighters that have cancer. I want to honor everyone that we know. Statistics tell us that cancer will eventually strike everyone's family. It is evident that it could happen to anyone. With your continued help and support, we can slow down these numbers of new victims and hopefully our children will not have to face cancer.

### Prostate Cancer: Prevention and Risk Factors

#### WHAT ARE THE KEY STATISTICS ABOUT PROSTATE CANCER

Prostate cancer is the most common cancer, excluding skin cancers, in American men. The American Cancer Society estimates during 2001, approximately 198,100 new cases of prostate cancer will be diagnosed in the United States. One man in six will be diagnosed with prostate cancer during his lifetime, but only one man in 30 will die from this disease. African-American men are more likely to have prostate cancer than white or Asian men are.

Prostate cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death in men in the United States, exceeded only by lung cancer. The American Cancer Society estimates that 31,500 men in the United States will die from prostate cancer during 2001. Prostate cancer accounts for about 11% of male cancer related deaths.

- 93% of all men diagnosed with prostate cancer survive at least 5 years, and 72% survive at least 10 years. These figures include all stages of prostate cancer.
- At least 70% of all prostate cancers are found while they are still *localized* (confined to the prostate). The 5-year relative survival rate for men with localized prostate cancer is nearly 100%.
- 12% of prostate cancers have already spread to tissues near the prostate when they are first diagnosed. The 5-year relative survival rate for men whose prostate cancer has spread regionally is about 94%.
- Of the 9% of men, whose prostate cancers have already spread to distant parts of the body at the time of diagnosis, 33% will survive at least 5 years.

The death rate from prostate cancer has been decreasing and men are being diagnosed earlier. This means that if you are diagnosed this year, your prognosis is probably better than the numbers above.

#### WHAT ARE THE RISK FACTORS FOR PROSTATE CANCER

A *risk factor* is anything that increases your chance of developing a disease such as cancer. Different cancers have different risk factors. For example, unprotected exposure to strong sunlight is a risk factor for skin cancer and smoking is a risk factor for cancers of the lungs, mouth, throat, larynx, bladder and several other organs. But having a risk factor, or even several, does not mean that you will get the disease. Many people with one or more risk factors never develop cancer, while others with this disease have no known risk factors. It is important, however, that you know the risk factors so that can try to change any un-healthy lifestyle behaviors, or can choose to have the early detection tests for a potential cancer. Research has found several factors that increase the risk of developing this disease.

**AGE** - The chance of getting prostate cancer increases rapidly after age 50. More than 70% of all prostate cancers are diagnosed in men over 65. If you are 70 years old, your chance of having prostate cancer is 12 times that of a 50-year-old.

**RACE** - Prostate cancer occurs almost 70% more often in African-American men as it does in white American men. African-American men are twice as likely to die of prostate cancer as white men are.

**NATIONALITY** - Prostate cancer is most common in North America and northwestern Europe. It is less common in Asia, Africa, Central America and South America.

DIET - Men who have a lot of fat in their diet have a greater chance of developing prostate cancer. Men with a high-fat diet also tend to eat less fruits and vegetables and more dairy products. Some doctors think that these other factors may be responsible for increased risk rather than the amount of fat itself. *Lycopenes*, which are found in especially high levels in some fruits and vegetables (such as tomatoes, grapefruit and watermelon), also, seem to lower prostate cancer risk, as does the mineral *selenium*.

PHYSICAL ACTIVITY - Regular physical activity and maintaining a healthy weight may help reduce prostate cancer risk.

FAMILY HISTORY - Prostate cancer seems to run in some families, suggesting an inherited or genetic factor. Having a father or brother with prostate cancer doubles a man's risk of developing this disease. The risk is even higher with several affected relatives, particularly if their relatives were young at the time of diagnosis.

#### DO WE KNOW WHAT CAUSES PROSTATE CANCER?

We still do not know what exactly causes prostate cancer. But researchers have found some risk factors and are making progress towards understanding how these factors cause cells in the prostate to become cancerous. During the past few years, scientists have made great progress in understanding how certain changes in the DNA can cause normal prostate cells to grow abnormally and form cancer cells. DNA is the chemical that carries the instructions for nearly everything our cells do. The reason that you might resemble your parents is because they are the source of your DNA.

However, DNA affects more than your outward appearance. Some genes in your DNA contain instructions for controlling when cells grow and divide. Certain genes that promote cell division

are called *oncogenes*. Others that slow down or cause cells to die at the appropriate time are called *tumor suppressor genes*. Cancers can be caused by DNA mutations (defects) that turn on oncogenes or turn off tumor suppressor genes.

Most DNA mutations related to prostate cancer develop during a man's life rather than been inherited before birth. Every time a cell prepares to divide into two cells, it must duplicate its DNA. This process is not perfect and sometimes, copying errors occur. Fortunately, cells have repair enzymes that proofread DNA. But some errors may slip past, especially if the cells are growing rapidly.

#### CAN PROSTATE CANCER BE PREVENTED?

Current information on prostate cancer risk factors suggests that some cases might be prevented. One possible risk factor that can be changed is diet. You may be able to reduce your risk of prostate cancer by eating a diet low in fat and high in vegetables, fruits and grains. The American Cancer Society recommends limiting your intake of high-fat foods from animal sources and choosing most of the foods you eat from plant sources. Eat five or more servings of fruits and vegetables each day. Bread, cereals, grain products, rice, pasta and beans are also recommended. These guidelines on nutrition may also lower the risk for some other types of cancer.

Tomatoes (raw, cooked, or in tomato products such as sauces), grapefruit, and watermelon are rich in *lycopenes*. These vitamin-like substances are *antioxidants* that help prevent damage to DNA and may help lower prostate cancer risk.

Because the exact cause of prostate cancer is not known, we do not know if it is possible to prevent most cases of the disease. Many risk factors such as a man's age, race, and family history are beyond his control.

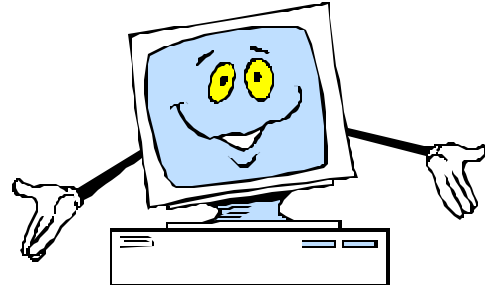
Awareness and operations level training for the WMD was completed during the month of June and we will be scheduling the Incident Command portion to do in conjunction with APD.

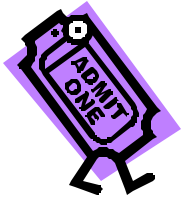
**World Police & Fire Games**

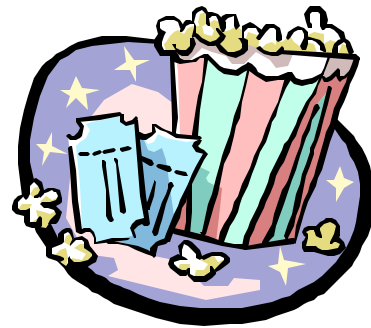
